Seacliff is unique in that Southern Eagle Rays (and the occasional rarer Smooth Ray) congregate in the shallows of the bay all year round. Elsewhere, rays visit seasonally. The City of Holdfast Bay recently installed an information sign by the Seacliff Boat Ramp. Locals and tourists alike enjoy watching and filming groups of rays. Rays have poisonous barbs but are placid unless trodden on or molested so take care and respect them.



PIRSA recently increased shark and ray protection after community pressure so fishers please check the new rules. They totally protect the Stingaree, also Southern Eagle and Smooth Rays larger than 1 metre in disc width, with a bag limit per day of 1 Smooth Ray and 2 Southern Eagle Rays of up to 1 metre disc width. The new laws also protect marine life, including fish, sharks and rays, from intentional harm or mutilation. If not being kept, they must be immediately returned to the water with minimum injury or damage (hooks preferably removed or the line cut as close to the hook as possible) while those kept must be killed

humanely and as quickly as possible. Offenses can be reported anonymously to Fishwatch on 1800 065 522 (open all hours) or online with any photo evidence.

Chloe Roberts of Flinders University has studied

the Seacliff rays for her PhD. Rays can be sexed - the male has pelvic fins modified into claspers - but age can only be guessed from size. Females are generally larger than males. Chloe found that nearly all the large Seacliff rays were adult females, averaging 1.3m in disc width. Eagle rays mature at 4-6 years old, then mate annually in spring, giving birth to live babies in the summer. The young don't stay with the mother so the small rays seen with females are likely to be males, but rays can only be accurately aged when dead so this may be a nursery site with babies. Chloe is continuing her research - we will keep you informed.





Unfortunately, rays are targeted by fishers as shark bait. A small ray was recently found butchered and left in the sea. Rays can live for over 15 years, are intelligent and, importantly, maintain the marine ecosystem, so it seems a sad use of them. Rays eat crabs, snails, small fish, squid and worms - either dead, which cleans up the seabed - or alive - excavating sand to seek prey redistributes nutrients and food, also creating microhabitats for smaller organisms. So respect them and enjoy their presence near us.


MCG and Neighbourhood Watch Marilyn Sumner

Welcome to new CEO Pam Jackson who has begun a review of projects and efficiencies within Council Administration.

Hooded Plover Assistance! A Council Motion for enhanced plover protection has led to a review of patrol resourcing, dog signage effectiveness and predator management strategies. A report with recommendations will be presented to Council to explore options for better enforcement, public education and potential budget allocations that safeguard the species. Thank you to our community who help with our littlest residents.



To raise awareness about safely sharing our beaches with **Stingrays**, Council has published information brochures, social media and installed education signage. I will continue to work with the community and experts to

advocate for and research our rays.

The "Pocket Park" project on the corner of Wheatland Street and Kauri Parade (East of the train line) begins in March with a Winter planting season. Thank you to the Seacliff Rail Care Group for assisting with this.

Movement and Transport Plan (MTP) Update:

The aim of this plan is to address traffic management and guide future initiatives (timing and prioritisation will depend on resources and funding). Community consultation last year led to development of the plan, which will be presented to Elected Members for review.






Boral Dust Update Peter Melnyk

Recent data from Linwood Quarry's TEOM dust monitors continues to show concerningly high dust levels. On 18th Nov and 4th Feb, levels exceeded the maximum-allowed 24-hour average of 50 mg/m³. From 3rd to 8th Feb, the Marino monitor recorded an average of 41.8 mg/m³ (see graph).

A number of homes are located within 200 metres of the crushing plant, the main source of dust from the quarry. Although symptoms may not occur for many years, exposure to particulate matter is a major contributor to lung and heart disease.

This is an old issue - strong community action

is needed to trigger change. New local MP Rt Hon Alex Dighton has been informed but email your concerns to black@parliament.sa.gov. au (Mr. Dighton), community@boral.com. au (Boral), and cc marinodust@gmail.com. au. Hooded Plovers

The Hooded Plover breeding season is July to March but this year in Seacliff it may have ended in January. After reporting the tragic loss of a chick, possibly killed by an e-bike in November, XM and partner laid another three eggs on the beach adjacent to Brighton Caravan Park. Two chicks hatched on 21 December – just in time for the busy holiday period, and five days later they moved to the storm drain adjacent to Young Street. One chick was predated by a Silver Gull and the remaining chick managed to survive 23 days (two-thirds of the way to fledging) before it disappeared – cause unknown. Since then, the two adults have been sighted at Marino Rocks but show no signs of breeding again.

Birdlife volunteers (supported by Green Adelaide) and Holdfast Bay Council invested heavily in site management, community education and compliance. Thanks to all involved including strong community support.

Marino Rocks Station Rail Care Group Andy Welsh

In January, Marino Rocks Rail Care met with our local MP, Alex Dighton. We gave him a tour of our station, showcasing the work we've done and sharing some of our concerns. One major issue is that, while most communities have now seen their stations upgraded to improve safety and comfort, the Marino Rocks community has been completely overlooked.

As a result, stations with similar passenger numbers have benefited from new shelters, digital signage, CCTV, emergency phones and tactile paving for the vision-impaired. Yet, there are currently no plans for Marino Rocks station to receive even one of these enhancements.

I am delighted to let you know that new traffic signals will be installed at the intersection of Brighton Road, Ocean Boulevard and Scholefield Road!

Labor is committed to improving the safety of road users, pedestrians and cyclists. We have listened to the community – particularly the incredible work done by the 5049 Neighbourhood Watch Group and its President Darren Bailhache to highlight the dangers of this intersection.

The installation of traffic lights forms part of a \$30 million upgrade - split 50/50 between

the State and Federal Governments. Upgrades have already been delivered at the intersection of Brighton Road and Edwards Street. Works on the Scholefield Road intersection will be completed in late 2026 to early 2027.

The new signals will significantly reduce congestion and maintain a consistent and reliable level of service and access, particularly as the area grows with new developments.

Working with the Malinauskas Labor Government, we are also upgrading the Marino Train Station to improve its safety.

We are making investments to improve our roads and transport and we thank the tireless efforts and advocacy of the 5049 community.
